Evidence summary for LISA LEES

MS CARTWRIGHT: Good morning, sir.

SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Good morning.

MS CARTWRIGHT: This is the chapter 12 evidence summary for Lisa Lees.

Present in the hearing room is Lisa's husband, Anthony, supported by his legal representatives. Also present in the room are Lisa's daughter, Lauren, her mother, and brother Lee. They are also supported by their legal representatives.

SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you all of you for coming.

MS CARTWRIGHT: Could I ask, please, for the photographs to be displayed?

Lisa Lees was the mother of Lauren and India Lees, the daughter of Ivan and Elaine Hunter, and the elder sister of Lee Hunter. She had two grandchildren, a grandson Jayden and her second grandchild, Dylan Jack, who she never got to meet. Her husband was Anthony Lees.

Lisa was born on 21 March 1974 in Oldham. She was 43 years old at the time of her death on 22 May 2017.

Lisa was an amazing daughter, wife, mother, sister and friend who made a real difference to the lives of others. Her husband, Anthony, described Lisa as great to be around, funny, exciting, full of laughter, full of life, and she enjoyed every minute.

He says: "She was the most positive and definitely the most beautiful person that I have ever met."

She was a caring and loving person, driven by a passion to succeed and achieve her goal in life, no matter how hard.

Her family are so proud of all that she achieved. After starting work at a beauty salon in 2007, Lisa obtained qualifications in beauty therapy and started her own business, providing aromatherapy massages to terminally ill children and children who were at the end of life, helping both the children and their families.

Lisa's brother, Lee, will now read the family's pen portrait summary.

LEE HUNTER: Lisa's mum, Elaine, remembers that the children's eyes would light up as Lisa entered the room. In 2012 Lisa's business won an award for excellence in practice. The family went to London to see her receive this award and were so proud.

Lisa then obtained a postgraduate qualification to

teach beauty therapy, graduating from Huddersfield University. She taught beauty therapy and also had ambitions to open her own beauty salon where her daughter, Lauren, was going to work.

Lisa put 100% into her family life and she was the heart and soul of her family. Lauren remembers her amazing mum, who was her role model as she was growing up and supported her when she was older. India remembers that her mum was the most beautiful, selfless and positive person she knew, who helped her with everything. Both Lauren and India describe their mum as their best friend.

Elaine remembers her determination and also how fun-loving she was, with an infectious laugh and the ability to light up a room when she walked in.

I remember how caring she was and that she was my best friend. She was full of love, full of life, and that was Lisa. She loved life, loved dancing, loved living, loved her friends and her family.

Thank you.

SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you very much.

MS CARTWRIGHT: Thank you.

Lisa and Alison Howe had attended the arena together with their daughters India Lees and Darcie Howe.

India and Darcie went to the concert together and

Lisa and Alison were to pick them up afterwards. The group entered Victoria Station shortly after 18.45 and arrived at the City Room at 18.47.

India and Darcie went into the arena through the Plus View entrance at 18.49 and Lisa and Alison left the City Room and walked through Victoria Station to Station Approach.

Lisa and Alison returned to Victoria Station at 22.25. They entered the City Room at 22.27.01. They walked across the City Room and walked towards the arena exit doors.

Wayne Cook, a firefighter, recalls whilst waiting to collect his daughter in the City Room, chatting to various people, including Lisa.

DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: Lisa and Alison waited near to the arena exit doors. Alison was standing slightly to the left of Lisa at 22.30.

Lisa was approximately 4 metres away from the bomber at the time of detonation.

CCTV shows that following the explosion, Lisa was lying on her back on the ground. Alison was lying on the floor nearby.

MS CARTWRIGHT: A member of the public, Michael Byrne, has been shown images from a sequence of events prepared of his movements and, in a statement dated 26 July 2021,

1 confirmed that a female he had referred to in an earlier  
2 statement was Lisa.  
3 In that earlier statement, he had described Lisa  
4 lying on her back, with her head towards where the  
5 explosion had happened. He said:  
6 "It didn't look like she was struggling to breathe.  
7 Her body wasn't moving as if she was breathing, just her  
8 mouth. Again, I didn't see any obvious signs of injury  
9 on her front. I thought she was struggling to breathe,  
10 so I was going to put her on her side again, but as  
11 I got to her and bent down to put my arm on her shoulder  
12 to ease her into the recovery position, I just didn't  
13 know what to do. She was still alive and I thought: if  
14 I don't move her, she's going to die; if I move her,  
15 she's going to die."  
16 After struggling to decide whether it was safe to  
17 move Lisa or not, Mr Byrne states that a male motioned  
18 towards Lisa and shook his head, and that he then stood  
19 up, realising there was nothing they could do.  
20 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: A member of the public,  
21 Robert Grew, approached Lisa at 22.38.02. He took hold  
22 of her right wrist with his left hand at 22.38.16.  
23 He stood up at 22.38.18 and moved away from Lisa.  
24 MS CARTWRIGHT: In his recent statement, prepared following  
25 review of his sequence of events, Mr Grew confirms that

1 when he went to Lisa, he recalls she was on her side and  
2 her eyes were moving rapidly and her breathing was very  
3 strained.  
4 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: Travel Safe officer  
5 Philip Clegg entered the City Room just before 22.33.  
6 He made his way around the City Room checking on  
7 casualties. His body-worn video captures Lisa at  
8 22.43.11. At this time, her head and upper body were  
9 covered with T-shirts.  
10 MS CARTWRIGHT: A member of the public, Jolene Smith,  
11 recalls in her statement, dated 28 May 2017, that she  
12 saw Lisa shortly after the explosion. She says that she  
13 knew that Lisa had died. She states that Lisa's face  
14 was beautiful and that her eyes were open, but they were  
15 not moving. Jolene Smith recalls that Lisa's hair was  
16 lovely and her make-up was still beautiful.  
17 Jolene Smith said that Lisa looked just like an angel.  
18 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 23.39.05, Patrick Ennis  
19 approached Lisa and knelt beside her. He placed a label  
20 on her in order to identify her as deceased at 23.39.15.  
21 He moved away from Lisa at 23.39.33.  
22 MS CARTWRIGHT: In his recently received witness statement,  
23 Mr Ennis confirms that he placed a label on Lisa to  
24 identify her as deceased at 23.39.30.  
25 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 00.36.02, Patrick Ennis

1 leaned over and checked the label that was attached to  
2 Lisa's right wrist, which identified her as deceased.  
3 MS CARTWRIGHT: I am now going to read a brief summary of  
4 the post-mortem findings and the findings of the  
5 blast wave experts and the review by the forensic  
6 pathologists.  
7 The initial post-mortem for Lisa was carried out by  
8 Dr Philip Lumb at Oldham Royal Hospital mortuary. His  
9 post-mortem report is dated 8 September 2017.  
10 Dr Lumb confirms that Lisa was declared dead at the  
11 scene on 22 May 2017. Dr Lumb provides a medical cause  
12 of death as 1A, multiple injuries.  
13 The blast wave experts' report is dated  
14 27 September 2019. The written conclusion of the  
15 blast wave experts is that her injuries were  
16 unsurvivable with current, as at 2019, advanced medical  
17 treatment.  
18 Finally, the review by the forensic pathologists,  
19 Dr Philip Lumb and Professor Jack Crane. Dr Lumb and  
20 Professor Crane provided a report in relation to Lisa,  
21 dated 8 September 2020.  
22 Their conclusion accorded with the conclusion of the  
23 blast wave experts that Lisa's injuries were  
24 unsurvivable with current advanced medical treatment.  
25 Sir, Mr Pete Weatherby of Queen's Counsel wishes to

1 say a few words, please.  
2 MR WEATHERBY: Good morning, sir.  
3 Lisa's mum, Elaine, has asked me to record publicly  
4 the thanks of her and the wider family for those that  
5 did their best to attend to Lisa in those appalling  
6 circumstances and I do so.  
7 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Lisa Lees was a much loved mother,  
8 grandmother, wife and daughter. She also had a very  
9 successful career, amongst other things she used her  
10 skills to help children who were terminally ill.  
11 In that way, she helped both them and their families.  
12 As I have heard, she had given a great deal, but she had  
13 so much more to give.  
14 MS CARTWRIGHT: Thank you, sir. We'll reconvene at 11.00.  
15 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you.  
16 (9.57 am)

19 Evidence summary for ALISON HOWE  
20 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Ms Cartwright.  
21 MS CARTWRIGHT: Thank you, sir.  
22 This is the chapter 12 evidence summary for  
23 Alison Howe.  
24 The legal representatives of the family of  
25 Alison Howe are present in the hearing room. Please can

1 the photograph of Alison and her family be displayed?  
 2 Alison Howe was the mother of Sasha and Darcie Howe  
 3 and the stepmother of Lewis, Jack, Jordan and Harris.  
 4 Her husband was Steven Howe and her parents were Susan,  
 5 Sue, Cann and George Cann.  
 6 Alison was born in Eccles on 24 May 1972 and she was  
 7 44 years old at the time of her death on 22 May 2017.  
 8 Alison was adored by her family. She loved being  
 9 a wife, stepmum and mum.  
 10 In the video pen portrait prepared by Steven Howe,  
 11 he described falling in love with Alison and how she was  
 12 the one who gelled the family together as a family unit.  
 13 Alison was caring and well liked in her circle of  
 14 friends.  
 15 Steven described how:  
 16 "Alison would be forever in our hearts and minds.  
 17 Every decision we make we always ask: what would Alison  
 18 have said, what would mum have said?"  
 19 Alison's mum, Sue, says that Steven and her children  
 20 were her everything.  
 21 Steven and Alison started dating after she took him  
 22 to hospital when he had been hurt in an accident. When  
 23 he regained consciousness, he told Alison that he loved  
 24 her and one day they would be married.  
 25 Steven remembers that Alison brought his family

9

1 together and that she couldn't have done a better job,  
 2 being a mum to his four sons as well as their two  
 3 daughters.  
 4 She was fantastic inside and out. Alison also had  
 5 a beautiful relationship with her mum, Sue, who she saw  
 6 nearly every day. Friday nights were their  
 7 mum—and—daughter time when they would put the world to  
 8 rights and laugh about the things that they had done.  
 9 Sue says that:  
 10 "You could never be sad or feel depressed when  
 11 Alison was with you because she would always know the  
 12 right thing to say and do to snap you out of it."  
 13 Sue describes Alison as "everything you could wish  
 14 for in a child": she was kind and loving and was someone  
 15 people liked to be around.  
 16 Alison was a very talented musician from the age of  
 17 5.  
 18 Alison's friend Tracey Green, who had known Alison  
 19 since they were both 5, remembers Alison's amazing  
 20 musical talent, particularly on the piano and violin and  
 21 recalls the time spent as a child waiting for Alison to  
 22 finish music practice before going up to her room to  
 23 sing songs while she played the piano.  
 24 As Alison and Tracey got older, they were part of  
 25 a large friendship group, and Alison was very much the

10

1 mum of the group, with a dry sense of humour that made  
 2 everyone laugh and smile.  
 3 Tracey says:  
 4 "Everyone thinks their best friend is perfect, but  
 5 mine really was."  
 6 Harry Howe wrote a poem on behalf of his brothers  
 7 and sisters that was read in court by Alison's friend,  
 8 Tracey, on 23 September 2020. In that poem, Harry  
 9 wrote:  
 10 "Alison, you saved our lives. I always knew, but  
 11 never fully ...realised always the glue, always the truth.  
 12 Our tree only blossomed from the strength of its ...roots  
 13 so special, so wonderful, so beautiful, so true."  
 14 Alison and Lisa Lees entered the City Room at  
 15 22.27.01. They walked across the City Room and walked  
 16 down towards the arena exit doors.  
 17 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: Alison and Lisa waited near to  
 18 the arena exit doors. Alison was standing slightly to  
 19 the left of Lisa at 22.30. Alison was approximately  
 20 3 metres away from the bomber at the time of detonation.  
 21 CCTV shows that following the explosion, Alison was  
 22 lying on the floor on her back. Lisa was lying on her  
 23 back on the ground adjacent to Alison.  
 24 At 22.34.57, Alison appears to have just been moved  
 25 by a member of the public, Michael Byrne, into the

11

1 recovery position. At 22.38.02, Alison is seen to be  
 2 lying on her right—hand side.  
 3 At 22.43.35, ShowSec member of staff Usman Ahmed  
 4 checked on Alison. She did not appear to respond. He  
 5 remained with or standing near Alison until 22.45.32.  
 6 MS CARTWRIGHT: ShowSec staff member Usman Ahmed recalls  
 7 interacting with Alison in his witness statement, dated  
 8 12 July 2021. That statement was prepared following  
 9 a review of his sequence of events.  
 10 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 22.51.14, ShowSec employee  
 11 Jade Samuels is seen to attend to Alison, and at  
 12 22.54.45, she is joined by ETUK first aider Marianne  
 13 Gibson, who crouches down next to Alison.  
 14 At 22.55.56, Marianne Gibson walked away, and  
 15 Jade Samuels started to perform chest compressions upon  
 16 Alison. BTP PC Jane Bridgewater was stood next to  
 17 Jade Samuels at this time.  
 18 By 22.56.20, PC Bridgewater had started to carry out  
 19 chest compressions upon Alison. Jade Samuels remained  
 20 with them.  
 21 Patrick Ennis leaned down to assess Alison at  
 22 22.56.58 and said that there was nothing that could be  
 23 done for Alison.  
 24 At 22.57.06, PC Bridgewater and Jade Samuels stood  
 25 up from beside Alison. Patrick Ennis also moved away

1 from Alison.  
 2 At 22.58.48, PC Anthony Sivori covered Alison with  
 3 white T-shirts as she lay on the ground.  
 4 At 23.34.49, Patrick Ennis approached Alison and  
 5 briefly knelt down next to her. It appears that he  
 6 lifted up one of the T-shirts that were covering her.  
 7 He then stood up and walked away.  
 8 Mr Ennis approached Alison again at 23.41.53, and  
 9 appeared to lift her right arm before standing up and  
 10 moving away.  
 11 MS CARTWRIGHT: In a recently received witness statement,  
 12 Mr Ennis confirms that he placed a label on Alison to  
 13 identify her as deceased at 23.34.54.  
 14 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 23.47.12, HART paramedic  
 15 Lea Vaughan knelt beside Alison. She appears to have  
 16 held Alison's right arm before she stood up and moved  
 17 away.  
 18 MS CARTWRIGHT: I am now going to read the very brief  
 19 summary of the expert and pathological evidence.  
 20 Alison suffered multiple injuries as a result of the  
 21 bomb and its shrapnel. Her death was caused by  
 22 a significant head injury, which medical evidence  
 23 indicates was unsurvivable.  
 24 Her medical cause of death was recorded at  
 25 post-mortem as 1A, head injury.

1 Sir, that concludes the evidence summary for Alison  
 2 Howe.  
 3 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you.  
 4 Alison Howe played an enormous part in her extended  
 5 family; she has been described as the glue that held  
 6 them all together. What happened on 22 May 2017 has  
 7 left an enormous gap in their lives. She also brought  
 8 happiness to a large circle of friends. She had worked  
 9 in the past as a nurse, she was a force for good.  
 10 MS CARTWRIGHT: Thank you, sir.  
 11 (11.11 am)  
 12 (The lunch adjournment)  
 13  
 14 (1.30 pm)  
 15 Evidence summary for WENDY FAWELL  
 16 MS CARTWRIGHT: Good afternoon.  
 17 This is the chapter 12 evidence summary for  
 18 Wendy Fawell. Observing the hearing from home is  
 19 Wendy's mother, Julia Tiplady, other family, including  
 20 Wendy's daughter, Charlotte and son, Adam.  
 21 Present in the hearing room are Wendy Fawell's legal  
 22 representatives.  
 23 Could the photograph of Wendy please be displayed?  
 24 Please could Kim Harrison from the family's legal  
 25 team now read the pen portrait summary for Wendy?

1 KIM HARRISON: Wendy Fawell was the daughter of Julia and  
 2 Michael Tiplady, the sister of Andrew and the mother of  
 3 Charlotte and Adam. Wendy was born on 12 December 1966  
 4 in Leeds. Wendy was 50 years old at the time of her  
 5 death on 22 May 2017.  
 6 Julia, Wendy's mother, remembers the amazing love  
 7 she felt for Wendy as soon as she was born. She made  
 8 their family complete.  
 9 Wendy grew up in Rawdon and, from a very early age,  
 10 showed that she was bright, sharp and a fast learner.  
 11 Sundays were special days for the family when they would  
 12 enjoy picnics by the seaside.  
 13 As she grew up, Wendy made many friends, some of  
 14 whom Julia is still in contact with today. Her best  
 15 friend was Sharon --- Michael and Julia called her and  
 16 Wendy "the terrible twos" --- and they remained friends  
 17 as they grew up.  
 18 Julia remembers Wendy taking to working with  
 19 children as a duck to water and that working with  
 20 toddlers was a dream to her. When she was older, she  
 21 worked with older children and her kindness and  
 22 compassion continued to shine through.  
 23 Wendy was so happy to be a mother herself and Adam  
 24 and Charlotte were always paramount in her thoughts and  
 25 deeds.

1 The family spent many happy caravan holidays  
 2 together, the memories of which have stayed in Julia's  
 3 heart. Wendy's father, Michael, died shortly after  
 4 Wendy's death. Julia says:  
 5 "I like to think he is with her now, doing what he  
 6 always did: looking after her."  
 7 Wendy's loving family spoke of how Wendy was such  
 8 a fun person, the life and soul of a party. She loved  
 9 socialising and spending time with family and friends  
 10 and she loved being a mum to Adam and Charlotte. Her  
 11 caring nature meant she tried to mother everyone. Adam  
 12 recalls his friends coming round to the house before  
 13 they went to the pub and Wendy rustling up food for  
 14 them. Wendy loved having people around her and she was  
 15 a brilliant cook. Her family remember that Christmas  
 16 dinners were amazing.  
 17 Wendy loved being outside, especially when the sun  
 18 was shining. Wendy had worked ever since she left  
 19 school. In recent years she'd worked at the before and  
 20 after school club for St Oswald's and Guiseley primary  
 21 schools and also as a dinner lady.  
 22 Wendy loved her job. She loved children and her fun  
 23 personality meant children warmed to her and enjoyed  
 24 spending time with her.  
 25 Wendy's family remember how she gave so much of

16

1 herself. In their words:  
 2 "She was the one that could be relied on."  
 3 MS CARTWRIGHT: Thank you.  
 4 Wendy arrived at Victoria Station shortly before  
 5 19.30. She had driven to Manchester with her daughter,  
 6 Charlotte, her friend, Caroline Davies, and Caroline's  
 7 sons, Ben and Lee.  
 8 Charlotte, Lee and Ben were going to the  
 9 Ariana Grande concert. Charlotte remembers chatting  
 10 about all sorts in the car and on the way to the arena.  
 11 Wendy and Caroline dropped Ben off with Charlotte  
 12 and Lee shortly after they arrived at Victoria Train  
 13 Station and then left the station through the exit that  
 14 leads to Long Millgate at 19.25.  
 15 Wendy and Caroline then went for a meal together in  
 16 Manchester city centre. Wendy and Caroline returned to  
 17 the train station shortly after 21.00 hours and then  
 18 left the station going towards Cathedral Gardens.  
 19 They returned to the station at 22.27 and went to  
 20 the City Room, crossing the footbridge that led to the  
 21 City Room at 22.30.20.  
 22 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: Wendy entered the City Room  
 23 with Caroline at 22.30.24. They walked across the  
 24 City Room, heading towards the arena doors. Wendy and  
 25 Caroline had moved apart from each other in order not to

17

1 miss their children as more people were exiting the  
 2 arena.  
 3 Wendy was approximately 5 metres away from the  
 4 bomber at the time of detonation.  
 5 At 22.31.13, CCTV shows Wendy lying on her left-hand  
 6 side on the ground. She was in the same position at  
 7 22.31.27 and at 22.38.22.  
 8 At 22.41.06, Travel Safe officer Philip Clegg leaned  
 9 over Wendy and sought to rouse her by tapping her on her  
 10 right shoulder area. He then moved to assist another  
 11 casualty.  
 12 Wendy does not appear to respond to Mr Clegg's  
 13 attempt to rouse her.  
 14 At 22.41.36, ETUK first aider Elizabeth Woodcock  
 15 knelt down next to Wendy and touched her on her right  
 16 shoulder. Ms Woodcock stood up at 22.41.48 and moved to  
 17 assist another casualty. Wendy is not seen to respond  
 18 to Ms Woodcock.  
 19 At 22.45.57, ShowSec employee Amy Barratt briefly  
 20 leaned over Wendy. Wendy is not seen to respond to  
 21 Amy Barratt.  
 22 At 22.46.10, ShowSec employee Robert Atkinson  
 23 crouched next to Wendy and placed both of his hands on  
 24 her right shoulder. Mr Atkinson moved away at 22.46.16.  
 25 At 22.48.44, ETUK first aider Sarah Broadbent

18

1 crouched next to Wendy. Liz Woodcock approached them  
 2 almost immediately. Sarah Broadbent then stood back and  
 3 walked away from Wendy.  
 4 At 22.52.45, BTP Sergeant Peter Wilcock bent over  
 5 Wendy and placed his hand upon her right shoulder.  
 6 After a short time, he then walked away to assist  
 7 another casualty. Wendy is not seen to move in response  
 8 to this interaction.  
 9 At 22.53.21, ShowSec employee Megan Balmer bent down  
 10 next to Wendy and touched her with her left arm. She  
 11 kept her left arm and hand placed on Wendy for several  
 12 seconds.  
 13 PC Leon McLaughlin approached them at 22.53.32.  
 14 Megan Balmer told him that she thought she might have  
 15 a pulse but it was very faint.  
 16 At 22.54.09, PC McLaughlin checked for a pulse on  
 17 Wendy's neck. Megan Balmer said, "Darling, darling, can  
 18 you hear us? Come on, come on", as she held Wendy's  
 19 left wrist.  
 20 At 22.54.17, as PC McLaughlin started to roll Wendy  
 21 over on to her back, Megan Balmer stood up and stepped  
 22 back. PC McLaughlin said, "She's dead, she's dead".  
 23 PC McLaughlin moved Wendy on to her left-hand side and  
 24 stood up.  
 25 Megan Balmer then picked up clothing from the floor

19

1 that had recently been obtained from the merchandise  
 2 stall. Off-duty nurse Bethany Crook, who was nearby  
 3 asked, "What's wrong?" Megan Balmer said, "She's dead".  
 4 Megan Balmer then placed a grey jumper over Wendy's head  
 5 at 22.54.34. She was assisted by PC McLaughlin.  
 6 MS CARTWRIGHT: In her witness statement dated  
 7 10 October 2017, Megan Balmer describes an interaction  
 8 with someone that corresponds to the interaction shown  
 9 on Wendy's sequence of events. Megan Balmer states that  
 10 she checked a female casualty and felt a faint pulse and  
 11 asked an officer to assist her. When they turned her,  
 12 they realised she was deceased. Megan Balmer states  
 13 that the casualty was totally unresponsive.  
 14 PC McLaughlin in his witness statement dated  
 15 24 March 2021, prepared following a review of his  
 16 sequence of events, provides details of his observations  
 17 of Wendy. He thought that her injuries were  
 18 catastrophic and that she was deceased when he saw her.  
 19 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 23.44.37, NNAS paramedic  
 20 Patrick Ennis knelt next to Wendy and placed a label  
 21 upon her in order to identify her as deceased.  
 22 MS CARTWRIGHT: Patrick Ennis has provided a witness  
 23 statement following a review of his sequence of events.  
 24 He confirmed that he attached a label to Wendy at  
 25 23.44.25 in order to identify her as deceased.

20

1 I am now going to read a brief summary of the expert  
2 and pathological conclusions.

3 The initial post-mortem for Wendy was carried out by  
4 Dr Naomi Carter at Oldham Royal Hospital mortuary.  
5 The post-mortem report is dated 25 September 2017.  
6 Dr Carter confirms that Wendy died at the scene on  
7 22 May 2017. Dr Carter provides a medical cause of  
8 death as 1A, head injury.

9 The written conclusions of the blast wave experts  
10 are that her injuries were unsurvivable with current, as  
11 at 2019, advanced medical treatment.

12 Turning finally to the review by the forensic  
13 pathologists, Dr Philip Lumb and Professor Jack Crane.  
14 They provided a report in relation to Wendy Fawell  
15 dated October 2020. Dr Lumb and Professor Crane  
16 conclude that Wendy's head injury was unsurvivable.  
17 This conclusion accords with the conclusion of the  
18 blast wave experts that Wendy's injuries were  
19 unsurvivable with current advanced medical treatment.

20 Sir, that concludes the evidence summary for  
21 Wendy Fawell.

22 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you.

23 Wendy Fawell loved children, not just her own but  
24 others that she worked with. Not only did she love  
25 working with them, but she had a great talent for it and

1 many children benefited from her care. She died as she  
2 lived: doing things for other people.

5 Evidence summary for NELL JONES

6 MS CARTWRIGHT: Good afternoon, sir.

7 This is the chapter 12 evidence summary for  
8 Nell Jones. Present in the hearing room are: Nell's  
9 mother, Jayne; her father, Ernie; her brothers, Sam,  
10 Will and Joe, and Joe's girlfriend, Emma Ingham; Nell's  
11 cousins, Hollie and Kevin Webb; and Nell's best friend,  
12 Olivia Watts and her mum, Rochelle Watts.

13 The family are also supported in the hearing room by  
14 their legal representatives, but also other family are  
15 watching from home.

16 Please can the photograph of Nell be displayed?

17 Could I please ask Kim Harrison from the family's  
18 legal team to read the pen portrait summary for Nell?

19 KIM HARRISON: Nell Jones was the daughter of Jayne and  
20 Ernie Jones and the sister of Sam, Joe and William. She  
21 was born on 16 April 2003 at Leighton Hospital in Crewe.  
22 She was 14 years old at the time of her death on  
23 22 May 2017.

24 Having been blessed with three wonderful boys, to be  
25

22

1 told Jayne and Ernie were expecting a daughter was  
2 a real surprise, especially considering no girls had  
3 been born on Ernie's side of the family for three  
4 generations.

5 From the moment she was born there was something  
6 special about Nell. She was a happy and contented baby  
7 who was surrounded by love growing up on the family  
8 farm. The family and many others remember Nell's  
9 fabulous smile. Nell loved her big brothers to bits and  
10 she grew from being their annoying little sister to  
11 a loved and dearly cherished sister.

12 Her family remember that Nell took to school like  
13 a duck to water, having loved books and anything to do  
14 with learning from an early age. Nell excelled at  
15 school but was always very modest about her ability.

16 Nell lit up every day for the family with her  
17 youthful energy and passion for life. Every day was an  
18 adventure for Nell and the family were carried along  
19 with her but recall:

20 "Those 14 wonderful years that we all shared  
21 together and the memories we made were truly special."

22 Her teachers remember Nell being a delight to teach  
23 and that she excelled at school. She was a talented and  
24 charismatic performer who really shone on stage. At  
25 school, Nell excelled in maths, even winning an award in

23

1 year 9 for her achievements. She was also very good at  
2 writing stories and poems. As well as her educational  
3 achievements, her teachers remember her smile and sense  
4 of fun. Mr Nichol, Nell's English teacher says:

5 "When I remember Nell, I remember a student who  
6 always seemed to be smiling. I remember a teenager with  
7 a wicked sense of humour. I remember a human being with  
8 a big heart."

9 The friendships she formed at school meant the world  
10 to Nell and her family recall that:

11 "If you were a friend of Nell's, you were in good  
12 hands."

13 She had a close friendship group with Olivia, Alex,  
14 Anais, and Alex and Olivia provided tributes to her that  
15 were heard at the hearing on 21 September 2020.

16 Olivia, Nell's best friend, said that:

17 "Nell was the best friend anyone could have wished  
18 for. She was kind and thoughtful and had a wicked sense  
19 of humour."

20 Her friend Alex said that:

21 "Nell was vibrant, outgoing and always there for  
22 everyone else."

23 Nell's enthusiasm gave Alex the courage to try  
24 things and they shared so many fun experiences together.

25 Nell also enjoyed many activities outside. She

24

1 loved to be around people and she particularly enjoyed  
 2 being a member of the local Young Farmers' group.  
 3 Nell's mum remembers her as:  
 4 "A beautiful girl, inside and out."  
 5 And her family remember that every day was an  
 6 adventure for Nell and her energy and passion for life  
 7 lit up their days.  
 8 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you.  
 9 MS CARTWRIGHT: Nell had attended the Ariana Grande concert  
 10 with her friend. Nell wasn't really a fan of  
 11 Ariana Grande, but was very excited to be going to be  
 12 concert with her friend who had kindly given Nell the  
 13 ticket.  
 14 Nell's mother, Jayne, had met Nell outside school on  
 15 22 May at 3.30 to give Nell her concert clothes. Nell  
 16 asked her mother if she had any money as she had hoped  
 17 to buy some merchandise at the concert. Jayne gave Nell  
 18 £20 and told her to have a lovely time. Nell replied  
 19 that they would.  
 20 Nell and her friend were very excited to be going to  
 21 the concert and had taken a long time together getting  
 22 ready. They were singing throughout the car journey to  
 23 the arena with an Ariana Grande CD playing loudly. They  
 24 were driven to the arena by Nell's friend's father and  
 25 he was to pick them up after the concert. He recalls

25

1 how happy they both were when they were dropped off and  
 2 recalls how polite Nell was, thanking him.  
 3 Nell and her friend entered the arena shortly after  
 4 19.30, through the Hunts Bank entrance. Nell's friend  
 5 remembers how much they enjoyed the concert and how they  
 6 were singing and dancing from the very first song.  
 7 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: They left the arena after the  
 8 final song of the concert. Nell entered the City Room  
 9 at 22.30.43 and walked towards the corner of the  
 10 City Room. Nell was approximately 2 metres away from  
 11 the bomber at the time of detonation.  
 12 CCTV shows Nell lying on her front on the ground at  
 13 22.32.06. Travel Safe officer Philip Clegg entered the  
 14 City Room just before 22.33. His body-worn video shows  
 15 Nell at 22.36.10, at which point she was still lying on  
 16 the ground on her front. Nell was not moving.  
 17 At 22.36.43, Mr Clegg leaned over Nell and spoke to  
 18 her, but Nell made no response. Mr Clegg then moved  
 19 away from Nell.  
 20 Mr Clegg's body-worn video shows Nell again at  
 21 22.42.59. She was in the same position as she was when  
 22 Mr Clegg's body-worn video showed her at 22.36.10.  
 23 At 22.43.05, Mr Clegg approached Nell again and  
 24 asked, "Are you okay? Hello?" but Nell made no  
 25 response.

26

1 At 22.53.28, PC Leon McLaughlin approached Nell and  
 2 checked whether she had a pulse, but then stopped  
 3 checking and walked away.  
 4 By 22.55.56, Nell had been covered by a pink jumper.  
 5 22.55.31, a member of the public, Darron Coster, was  
 6 standing by Nell with a light-coloured jumper in his  
 7 hands. At 22.55.33 the footage shows that he bent down  
 8 by Nell. It is believed that he covered Nell with the  
 9 jumper that was in his hands. Mr Coster walked away  
 10 from Nell at 22.55.35.  
 11 Nell is then seen in the body-worn video of officers  
 12 as they move around the City Room. She remains covered  
 13 throughout this period of time.  
 14 MS CARTWRIGHT: Nell was also seen in the City Room by  
 15 PC Anthony Sivori and Sergeant Kam Hare. In his witness  
 16 statement, dated 15 July 2021, PC Sivori states that he  
 17 believes Nell was one of the first people he approached  
 18 in the City Room. He states that it was obvious to him  
 19 that she was deceased.  
 20 DETECTIVE INSPECTOR RUSSELL: At 23.41.54, NWS HART  
 21 paramedic Lea Vaughan attaches a label to Nell's right  
 22 wrist in order to identify her as deceased.  
 23 MS CARTWRIGHT: I am now going to read a brief summary of  
 24 the conclusions of the pathological and expert evidence.  
 25 The initial post-mortem for Nell was carried out by

27

1 Dr Charles Wilson at Oldham Royal Hospital. His  
 2 post-mortem report is dated 11 September 2017.  
 3 Dr Wilson identifies that Nell's injuries suggest  
 4 that the explosion struck her body on the left posterior  
 5 aspect and he provides a medical cause of death as 1A,  
 6 multiple injuries.  
 7 The blast wave experts' report is dated  
 8 27 September 2019. The written conclusion of the  
 9 blast wave experts is that Nell's injuries were  
 10 unsurvivable with current, as at 2019, advanced medical  
 11 treatment.  
 12 Turning then to the review by the forensic  
 13 pathologists, Dr Lumb and Professor Crane. Dr Lumb and  
 14 Professor Crane provided a report in relation to Nell  
 15 dated October 2020. They confirm that Nell died at the  
 16 scene. They conclude that her injuries were  
 17 unsurvivable and this conclusion accords with the  
 18 conclusion of the blast wave experts that Nell's  
 19 injuries were unsurvivable with current advanced medical  
 20 treatment.  
 21 Sir, that concludes the evidence summary for  
 22 Nell Jones.  
 23 SIR JOHN SAUNDERS: Thank you.  
 24 Nell Jones was a talented 14-year-old and on  
 25 22 May 2017, she didn't have a care in the world. She

1 had a successful and happy life opening out in front of  
 2 her. She had everything: she had very good friends and  
 3 enjoyed life to the full and made the best of  
 4 everything. To lose all that is a tragedy and is so  
 5 unfair. I can only say to her family, friends and all  
 6 those who knew her and loved her, I feel for your loss.
